WHAT WE LEARNED

Through participation in the COACH program, Veterans with dementia have an increased likelihood of dying at home regardless of age, race, or level of dementia.

INTRODUCTION

- ❖ COACH is a consultative interdisciplinary homebased dementia care program that offers support, education, and assistance with resources to caregivers of Veterans with dementia.
- Eligibility Criteria for COACH:
- Age ≥65
- Veterans with moderate to severe dementia
- Caregiver in home
- Durham VA Medical Center, Morehead City Community-Based Outpatient Clinic, and Greenville Health Care Center

AIM

❖ To determine the number of Veterans enrolled in the COACH program who die at home


METHODS


- ❖ Record review of all Veterans enrolled at any time into the COACH program including Veterans discharged from the COACH program
- Determined care setting in which they died "Home" and "Not at Home"
- Compared various demographic data among Veterans enrolled in the COACH program


RESULTS


430 Veterans died after enrollment in the COACH program, 41% of whom died at home.

- **❖** Per United States death certificate data, 24% of all deaths occur at home¹
- **❖** Per Medicare data, an estimated 22-30% of deaths occur at home²
- ❖ Of adults with the diagnosis of dementia on their death certificate, only 13% die at home³









Veterans who died "Not at Home" included those who died in the hospital, skilled nursing facility, assisted living facility, or inpatient hospice.
